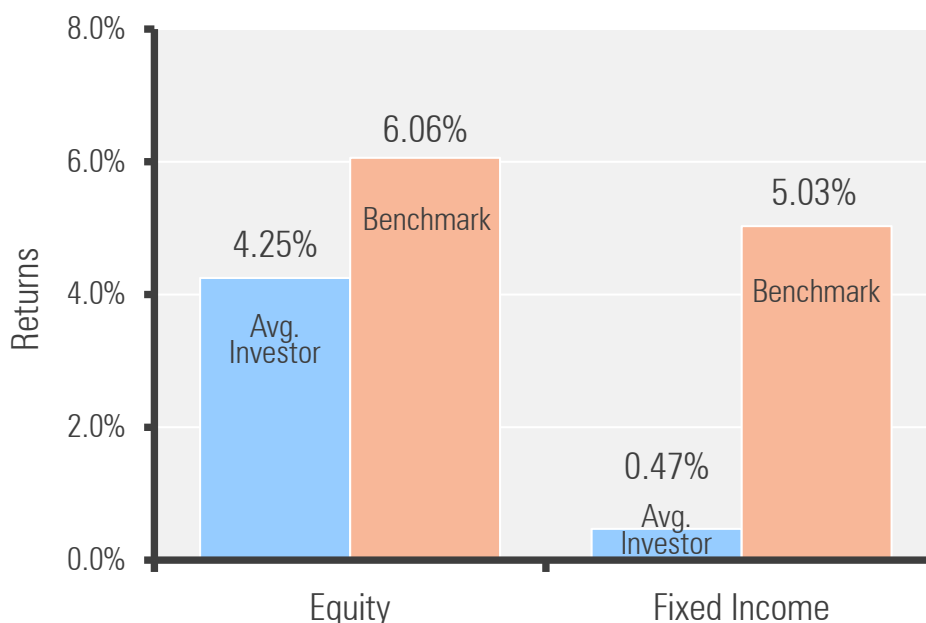

Average Investor Performance vs. Market Benchmarks | January 2000 – December 2019

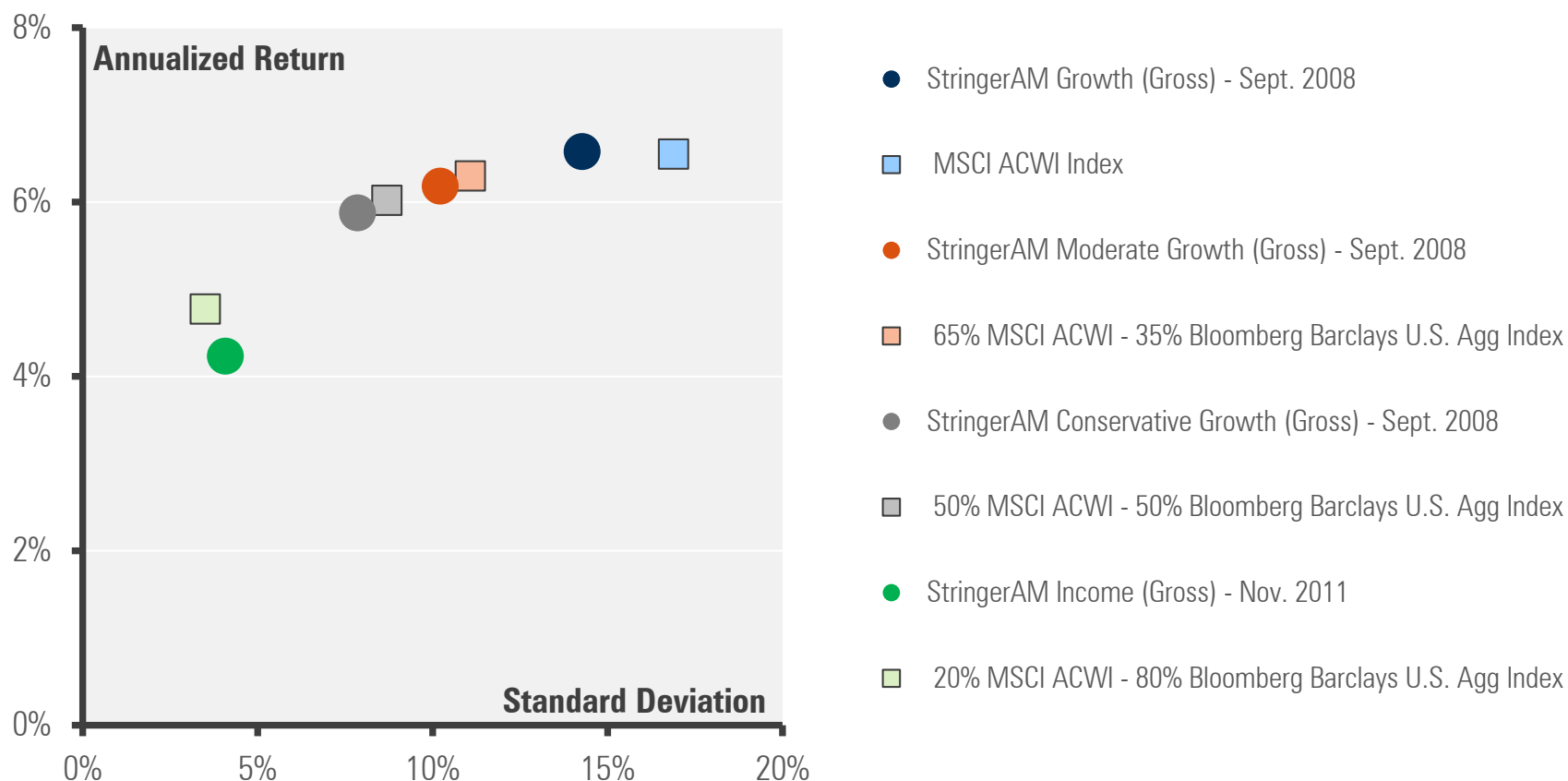

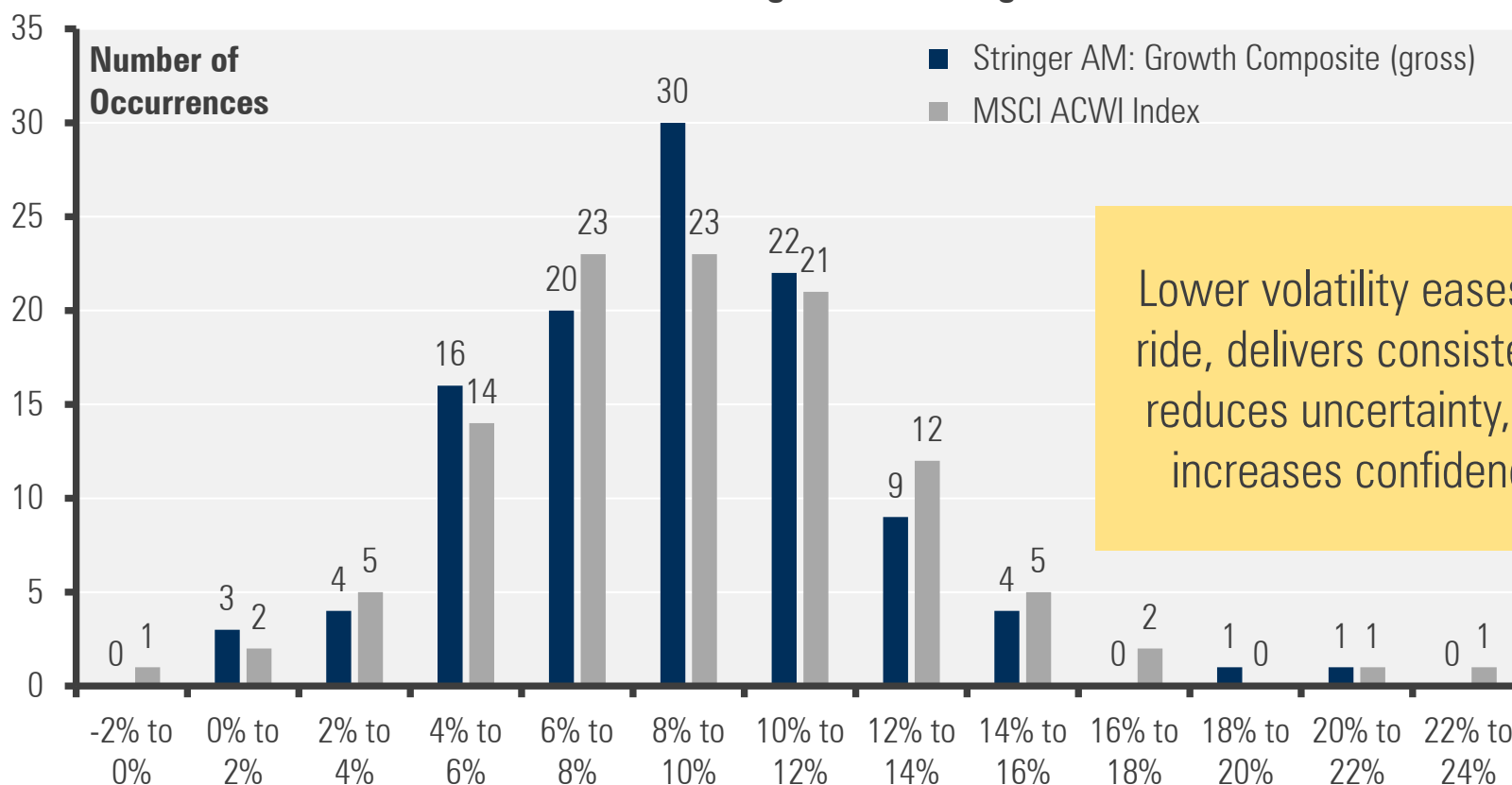
RISK/REWARD PLOT¹: SINCE INCEPTION TO SEPTEMBER 2020

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BROAD OUTLOOK

- » Our strategic and tactical work suggests that both the market and economic recoveries will persist, albeit at a slower pace.
- » The U.S. economy likely expanded by roughly 30% on an annualized basis this past quarter based on the indicators we monitor.
- » Our most sensitive leading indicators, such as liquidity growth, inflation expectations, and the prices of industrial metals, started to turn upwards in April and May.
- » As support spreads through the economy more broadly, we are seeing consistent gains in more fundamental leading indicators, such as various purchasing manager indices (PMIs).
- » As businesses improve, we will likely see more productivity growth and additional jobs creation.
- » While the pace of business improvements will likely slow in the coming months, the stock market's advancement should also broaden to include areas beyond online shopping.
- » With the pending election, we expect some market volatility leading up to and even following election day.
- » However, elections actually have little impact on broad U.S. economic and market outcomes.
- » As an open and free market economy, long-term economic and market performance is primarily driven by the private sector.

SAMPLE OF RECENT ADDITIONS

We recently purchased ETFs focused on financials, consumer staples, and other defensive and cyclical businesses, such as home builders. In our view, these sectors and industries have further room to run. Our base-case scenario is persistent economic growth over the next few years based on improving fundamentals and accommodative U.S. Federal Reserve policy. As fiscal and monetary support spreads through the economy more broadly, we are seeing consistent gains in more fundamental leading indicators, such as various purchasing manager indices (PMIs). While the pace of business improvements will likely slow in the coming months, the stock market's advancements should also broaden to include areas beyond internet related businesses. We think that the ETFs we recently purchased stand to benefit from this broadening improvement.

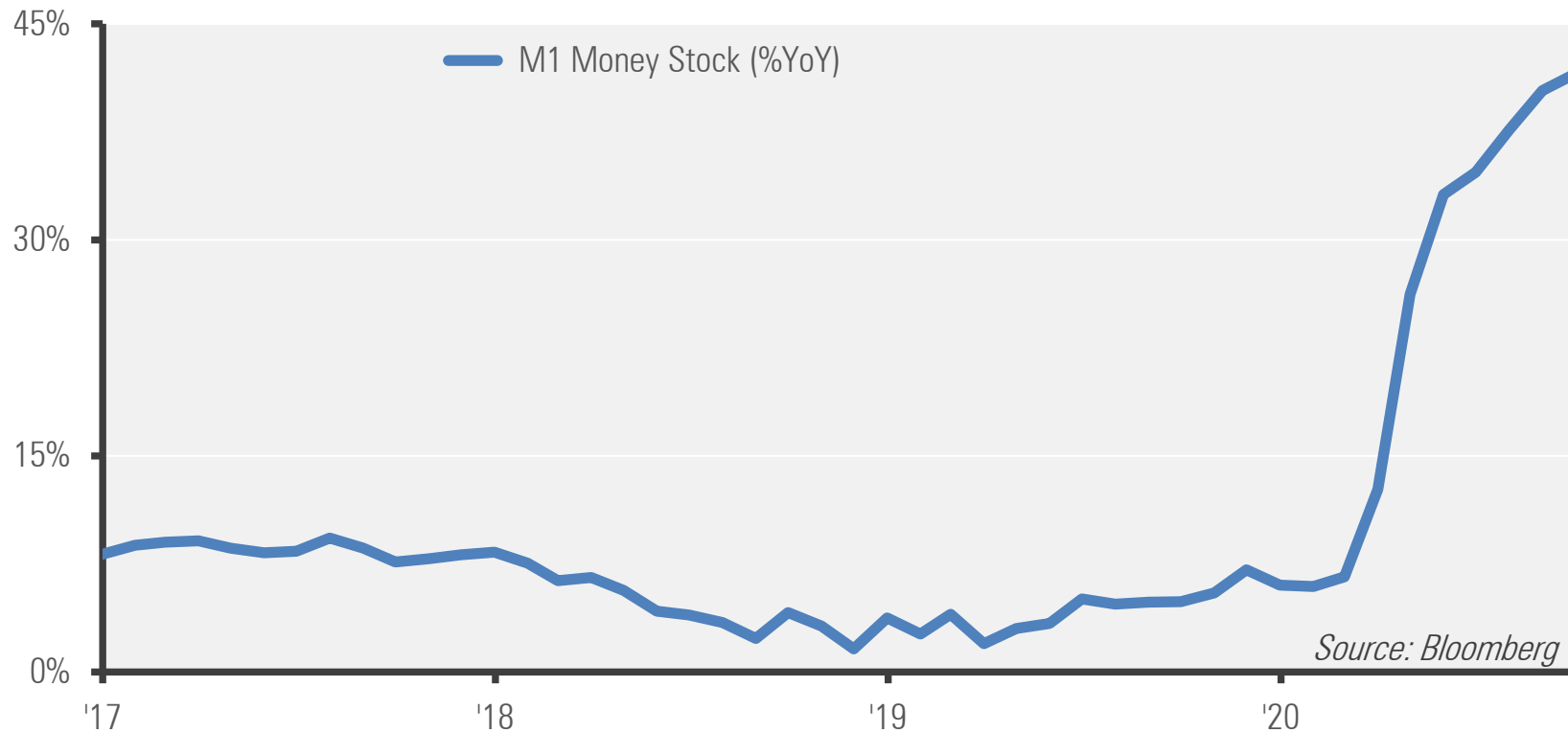
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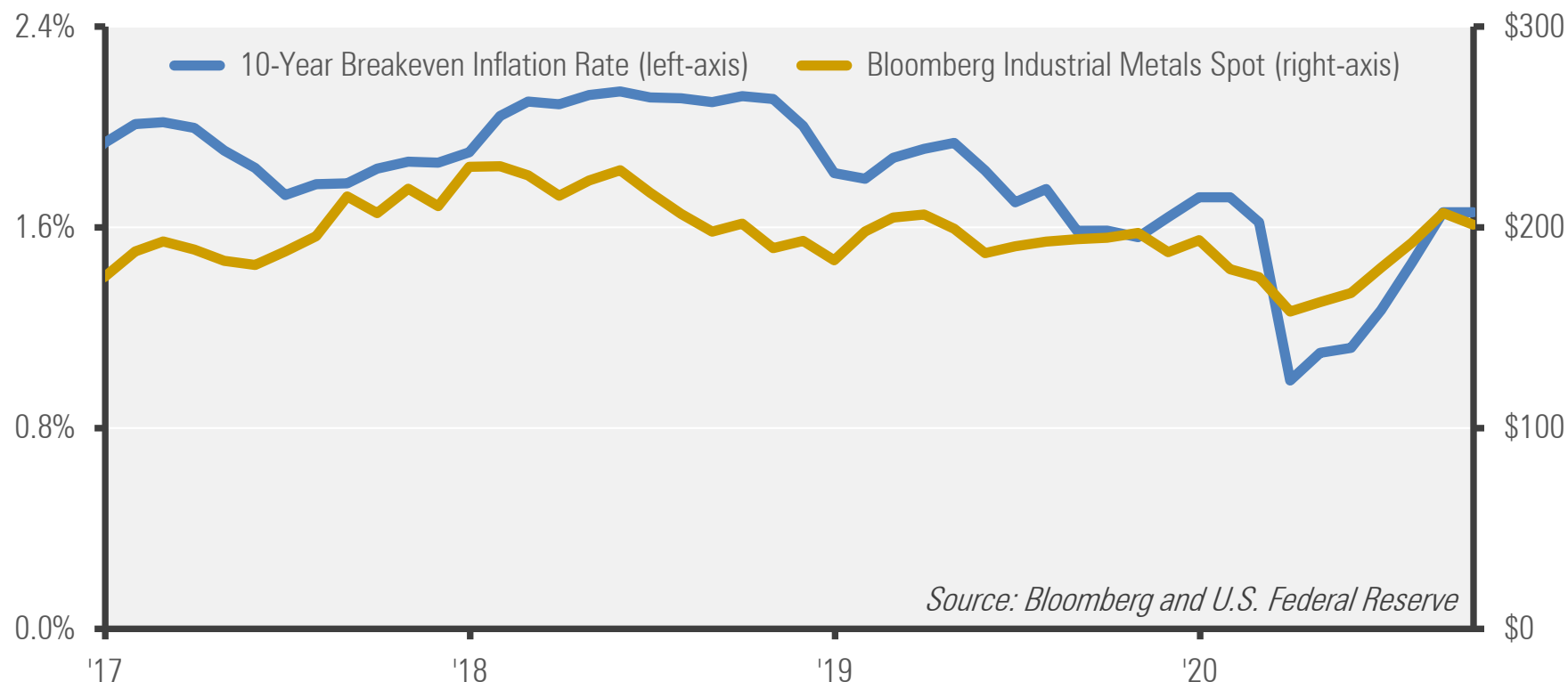
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Money Stock Growth

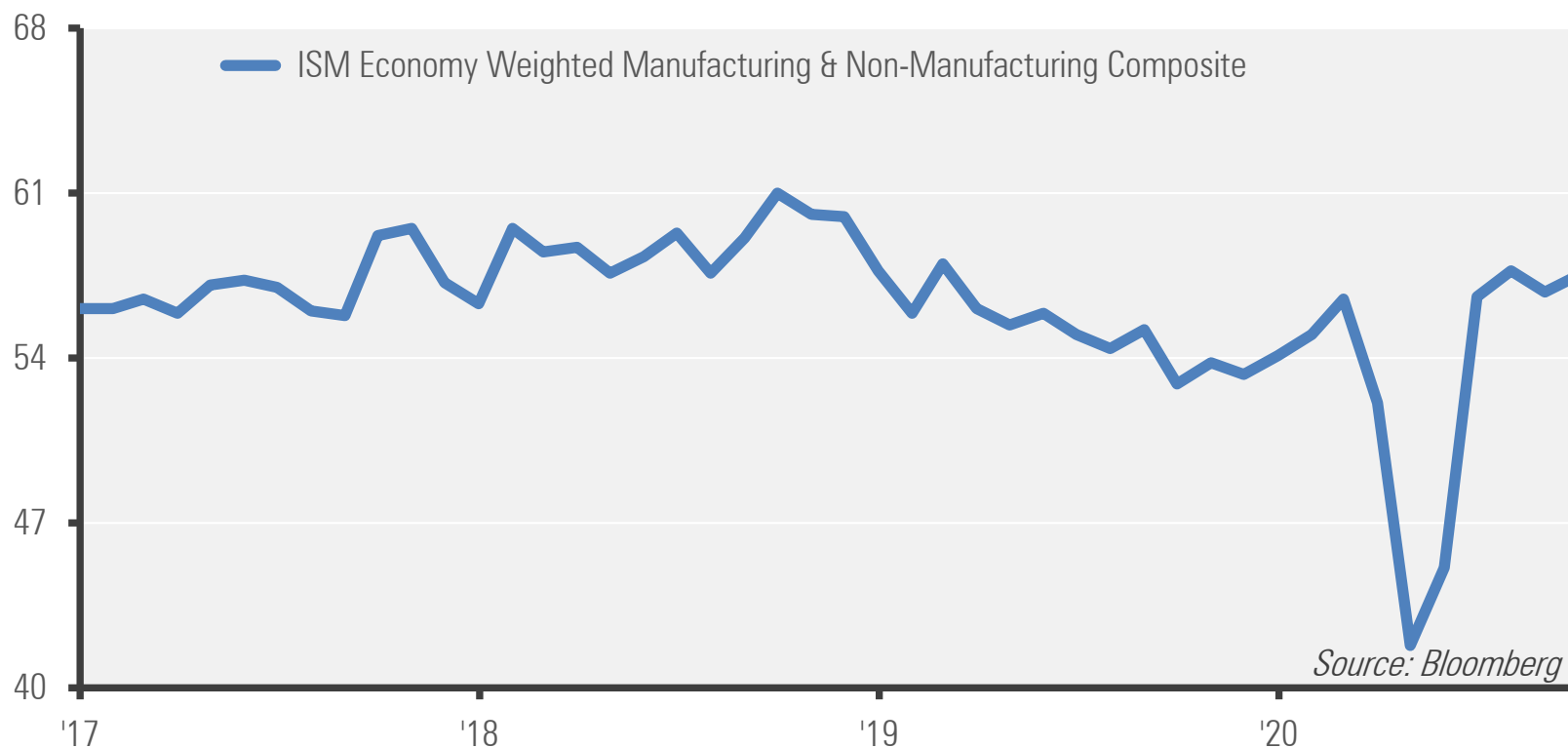


- » Our most sensitive leading indicators, such as liquidity growth, inflation expectations, and the prices of industrial metals, started to turn upwards in April and May.
- » These trends continue today.
- » In fact, on a year-over-year basis, liquidity growth in the U.S., as measured by narrow money or M1, has grown by almost 45%, which is the fastest pace of any major economy in the world.

Inflation Expectations

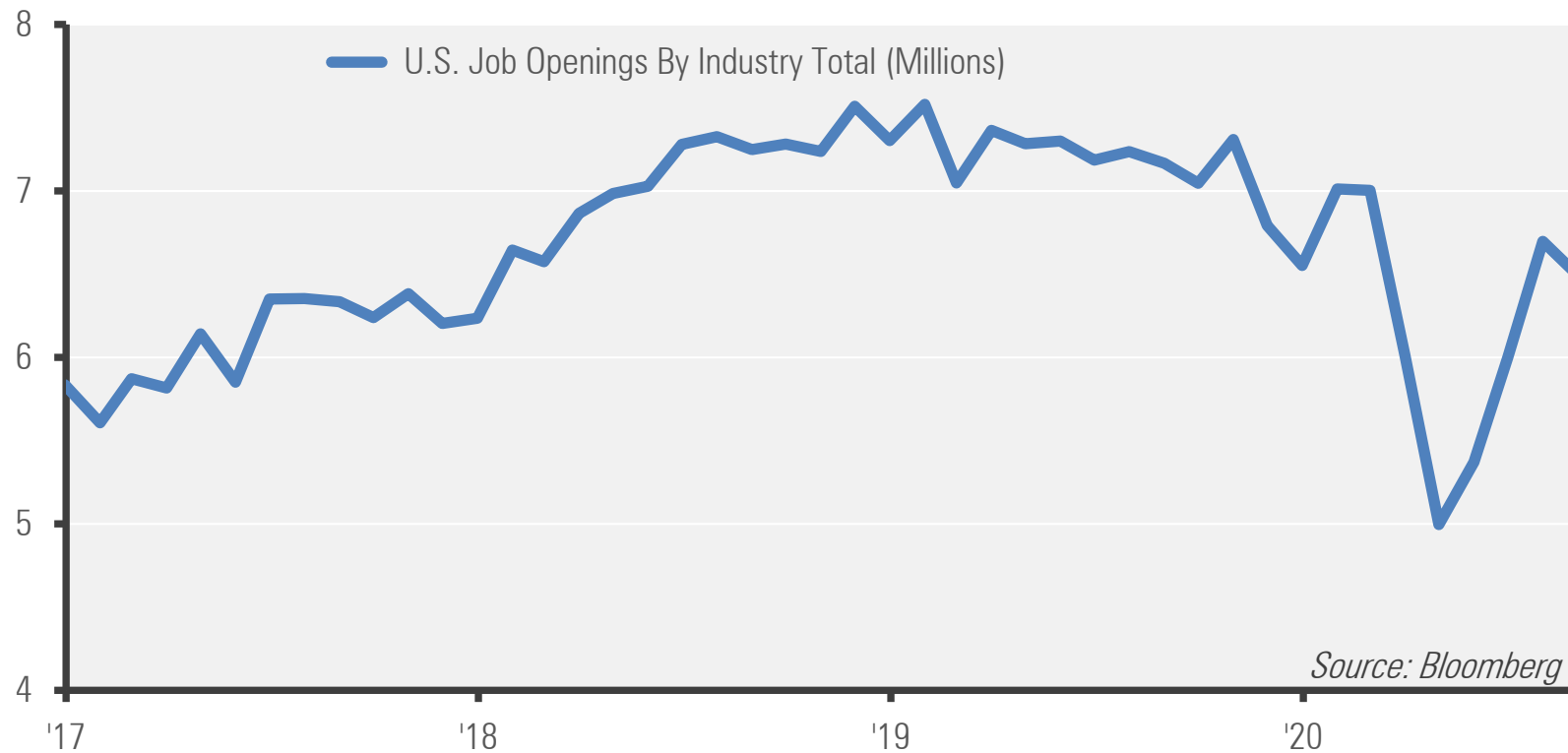


- » Market-based inflation expectations have improved in the U.S. better than in any other country.
- » This suggests that the Fed's policy actions have not only helped to stabilize the markets, but also are helping to improve economic activity.



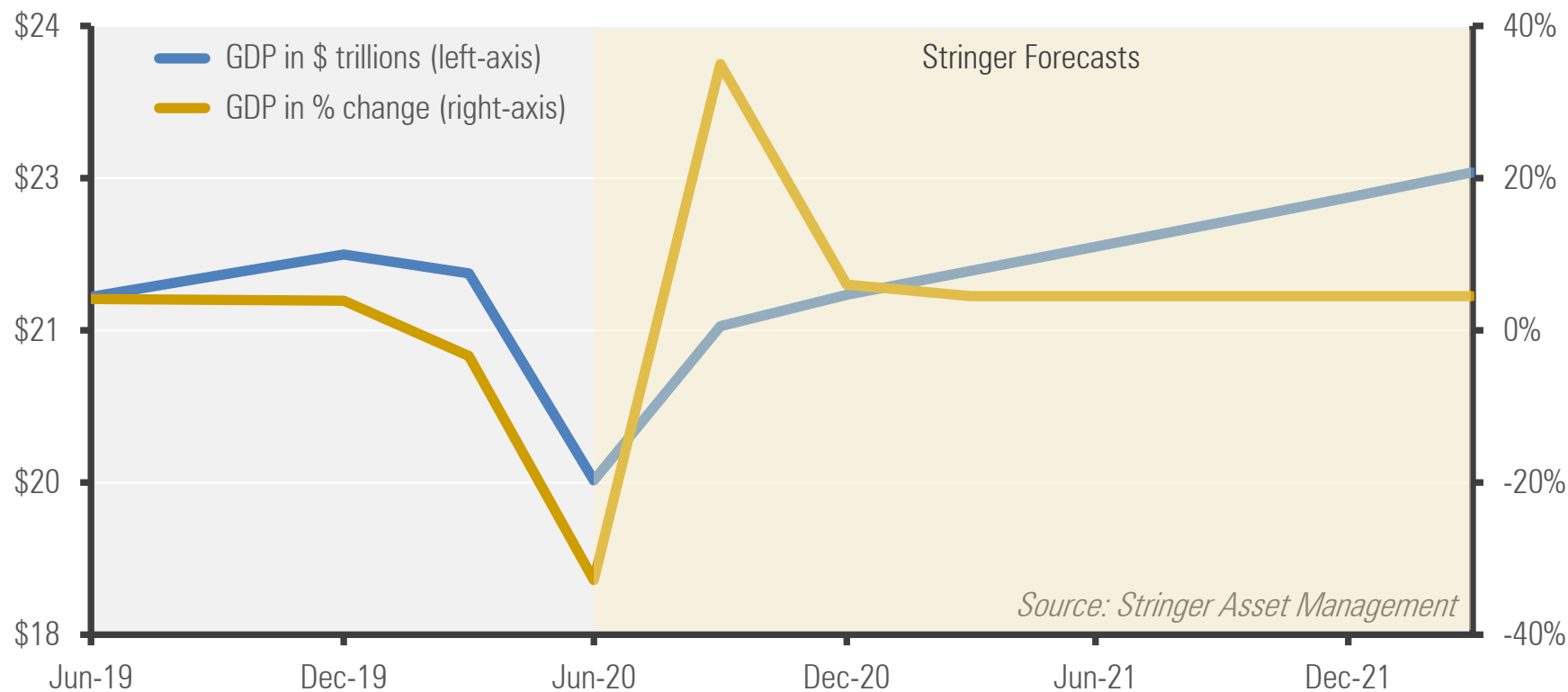
- » As support spreads through the economy more broadly, we are seeing consistent gains in more fundamental leading indicators, such as various purchasing manager indices (PMIs).
- » PMI improvements, along with other fundamental indicators, are a positive reflection of overall business confidence, which tends to lead to increases in capital investment.
- » As the graph illustrates, these business surveys have made a sharp and impressive recovery.

U.S. Job Openings



- » With businesses improving, we will likely see more productivity growth and additional jobs creation.
- » In fact, the number of open jobs has risen to over 6 million.
- » This represents both another sharp recovery and suggests there is a strong case for future jobs gains.

Stringer GDP Forecast



- » Still, much of the lost economic ground has already been regained, and our indicators suggest that the pace of improvement will slow.
- » This is reflected in our GDP forecast of roughly 30% annualized growth in the third quarter, followed by 6% annualized growth in the fourth quarter, and an average growth of 4.5% in 2021.

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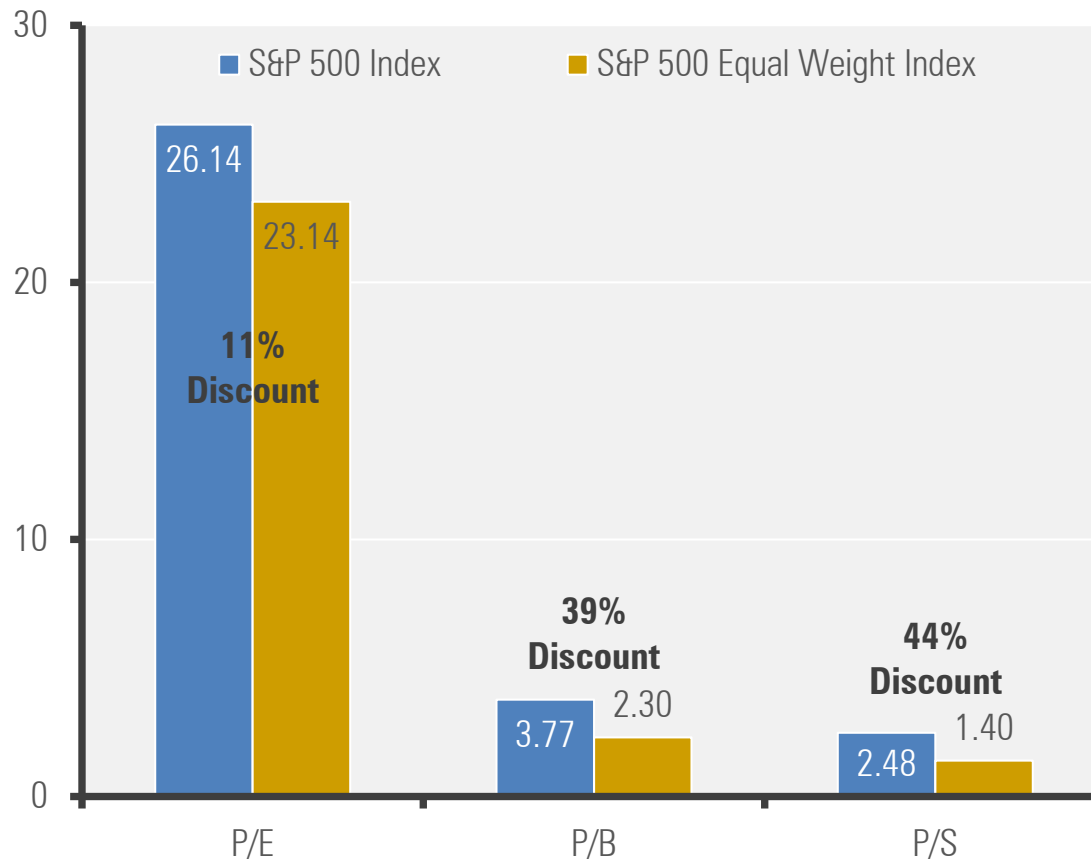
INVESTMENT IMPLICATIONS

- » While the pace of business improvements will likely slow in the coming months, stock market advancements should broaden to include areas beyond online shopping.
- » Reflecting the realities of the COVID economy, internet and technology related businesses boomed and their stock prices soared.
- » This was exhibited in the largest companies in the S&P 500 Index, which all benefited from this environment.
- » Combined, these points have led us to favor areas of the equity markets that we think can benefit both strategically and tactically from the sustained economic recovery and where stock prices still have room to run in our opinion.
- » These opportunistic areas include health care, consumer staples, industrials, and financials among others.
- » At the same time, we acknowledge the great uncertainty related to geopolitics, the pandemic, and the upcoming election.

INVESTMENT IMPLICATIONS

- » Having the ability to allocate for the long-term combined with the capability to respond tactically to both short-term opportunities and risks should be meaningful going forward.
- » As we can see globally, pockets of COVID-19 outbreaks are likely to lead to regional restrictions, but not a reversal of the recovery.
- » With the pending election, we expect some market volatility leading up to and even following election day.
- » However, our decades of work in this area suggest that elections actually have little impact on broad U.S. economic and market outcomes.
- » There are sectors that can be influenced by political headwinds and tailwinds, and we will be particularly attuned to them for tactical signs of risk and opportunity.
- » However, as an open and free market economy, long-term economic and market performance is primarily driven by the private sector.

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- » The S&P 500 Price Index has risen more than 4% while the equally weighted Index is down more than 6% YTD.
- » Clearly their dispersion is striking, however, we see an opportunity.
- » The S&P 500 Index is significantly more expensive than the equally weighted version.

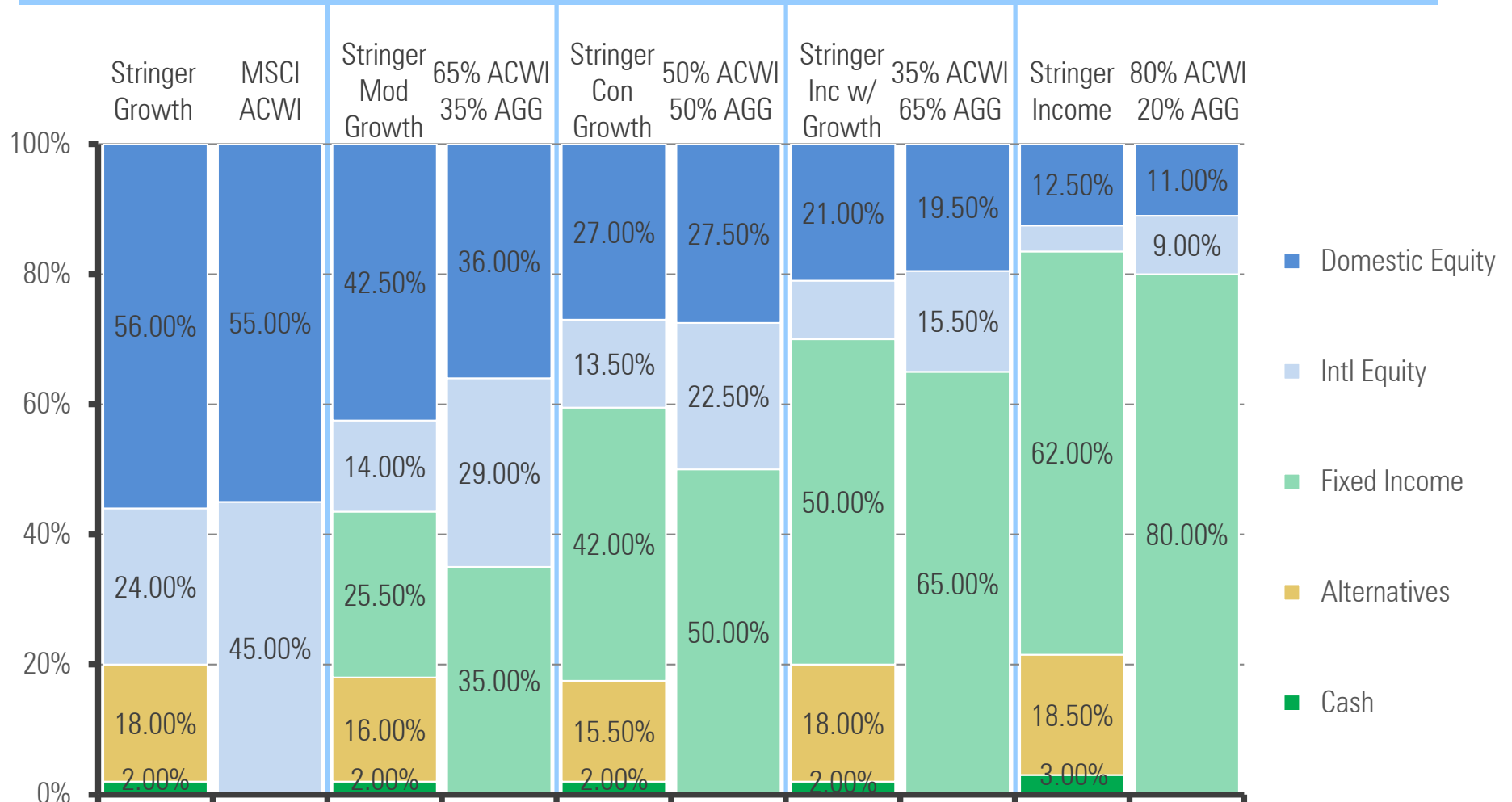
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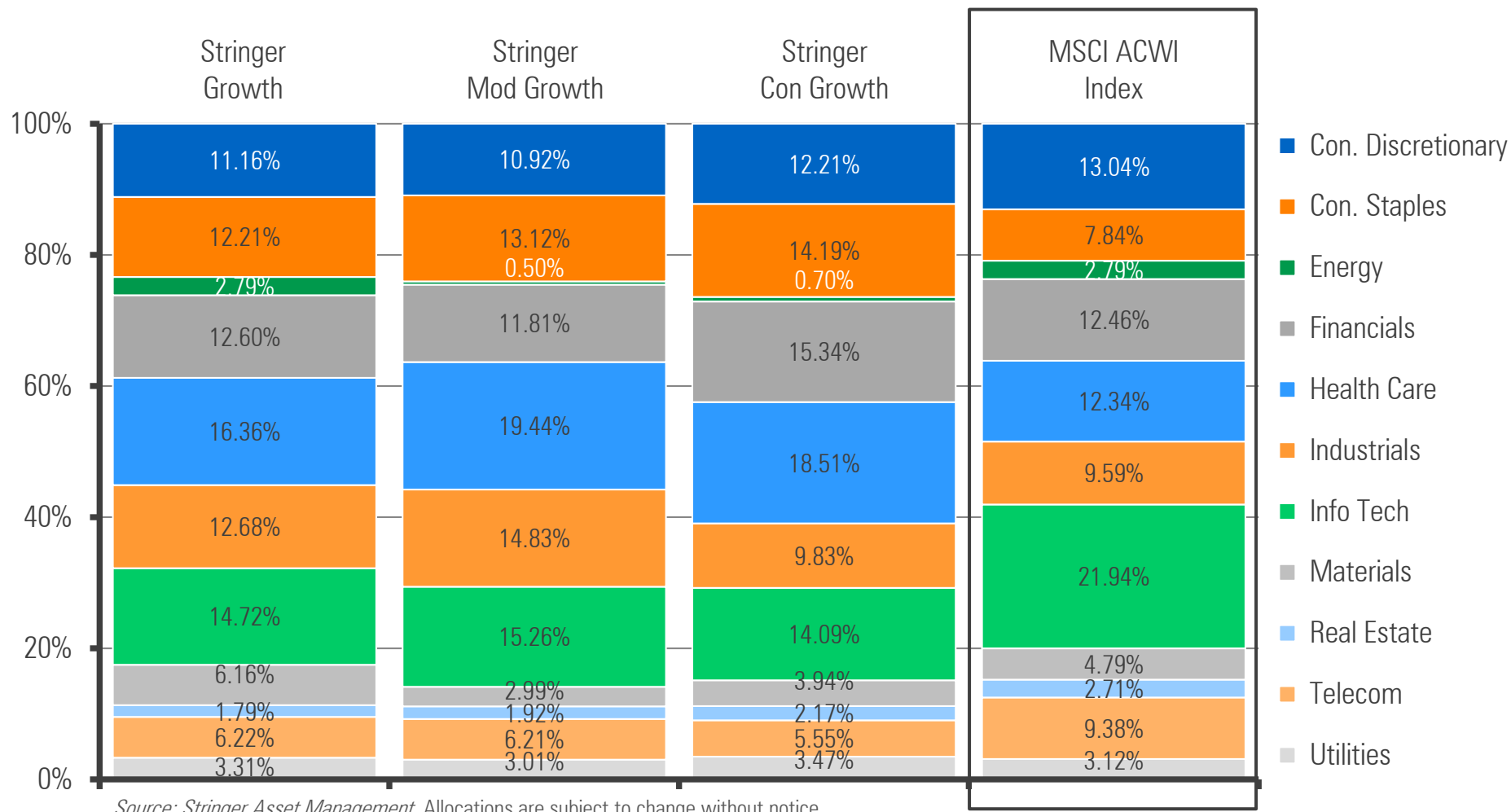
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BROAD ASSET ALLOCATION AS OF OCTOBER 2020

TRADITIONAL EQUITY SECTOR ALLOCATION AS OF OCTOBER 2020

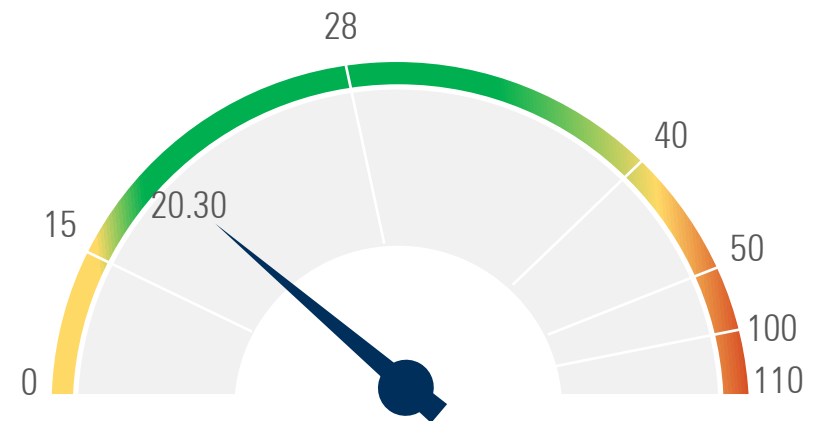
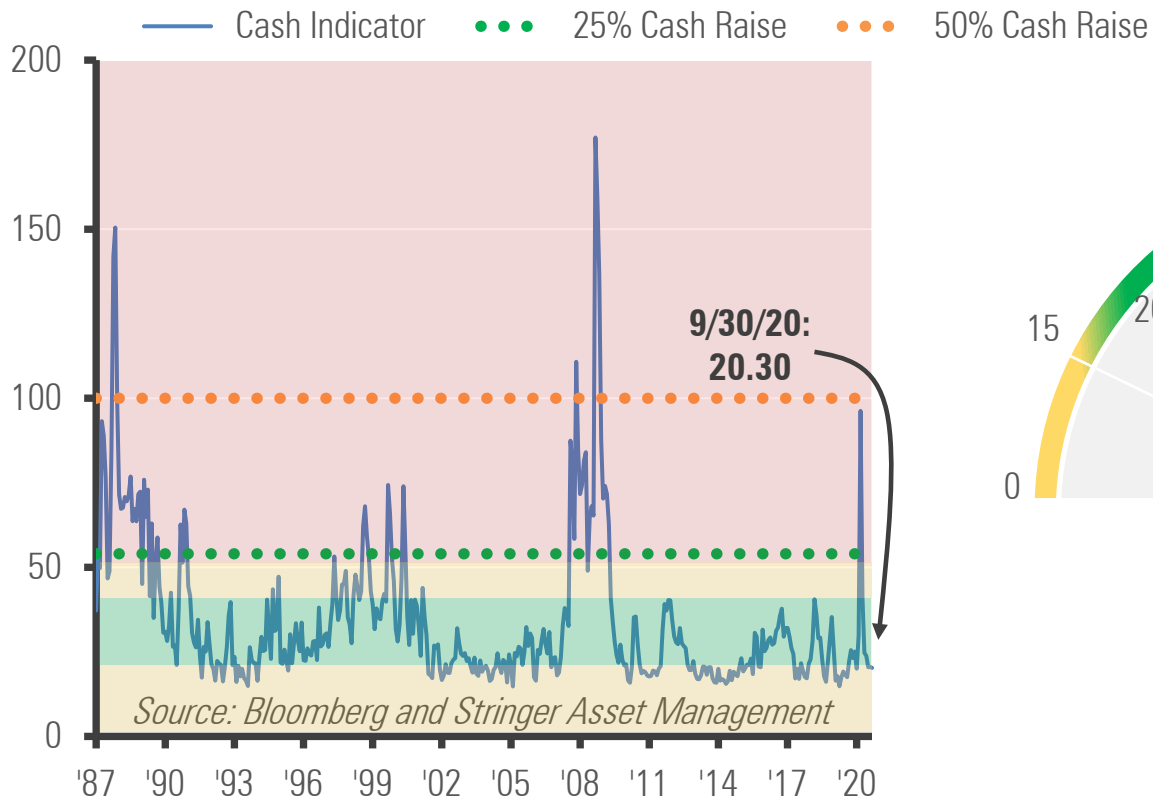


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The Cash Indicator



- » In a year where the Cash Indicator (CI) served as an invaluable portfolio management tool, we have seen the level of our CI continue to decline recently.
- » Keep in mind that the CI informs us about extreme market dislocations on the high end and complacency on the low end.
- » Currently, the CI remains above the threshold that makes us concerned about market complacency, but we think that investors should still be prepared for volatility.
- » We think that market volatility presents a buying opportunity for disciplined investors.

Index Definitions:

Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Aggregate Bond Index – This Index provides a measure of the U.S. investment grade bond market, which includes investment grade U.S. Government bonds, investment grade corporate bonds, mortgage pass-through securities and asset-backed securities that are publicly offered for sale in the United States. S&P 500 Index – This Index is a capitalization-weighted index of 500 stocks. The Index is designed to measure performance of a broad domestic economy through changes in the aggregate market value of 500 stocks representing all major industries.

S&P 500 Equal Weight Index – This Index is an equal-weight version of the widely used S&P 500 Index. The index includes the same constituents as the capitalization weighted S&P 500 Index, but each company in the S&P 500 Equal Weight Index is allocated a fixed weight of roughly 0.2% of the Index total at each quarterly rebalance.

Statistical Definitions:

Standard Deviation – A statistical measure of volatility, standard deviation is often used as an indicator of the ‘risk’ associated with a return series. Standard deviation of return measures the average deviations of a return series from its mean. A large standard deviation implies that there have been large swings in the return series of the manager.

Alpha – Alpha is a measure of risk (beta)-adjusted return. Alpha measures the difference between a portfolio’s actual returns and what it might be expected to deliver based on its level of risk. In an ideal sense, higher risk should equate to higher return. A positive alpha means the fund has beaten expectations. A negative alpha means that the fund has failed to match performance given its level of risk. If two managers have the same return, but one has a lower beta, that manager would have a higher alpha.

Beta – This represents the systematic risk of a portfolio and measures its sensitivity to a benchmark. A portfolio with a beta of one is considered to be as risky as the benchmark and would therefore provide expected returns equal to those of the market benchmark during both up and down periods. A portfolio with a beta of two would move approximately twice as much as the benchmark.

Yield – Portfolio and blended benchmark yield is calculated using a harmonic weighted average of the net dividends per share during the past 12 months for each holding as of the date identified at their respective target weighting.

Risks Related to Management Through Similarly Managed Accounts: For certain clients, Stringer Asset Management manages strategies by allocating assets among various securities on a discretionary basis using one or more of its proprietary investment strategies (collectively referred to as “investment strategy”). In so doing, Stringer Asset Management buys, sells, exchanges and/or transfers securities based upon the investment strategy. Stringer Asset Management’s management using the investment strategy complies with the requirements of Rule 3a-4 of the Investment Company Act of 1940, as amended. Rule 3a-4 provides similarly managed accounts, such as the investment strategy, with a safe harbor from the definition of an investment company. The investment strategy may involve an above-average portfolio turnover that could negatively impact upon the net after-tax gain experienced by an individual client. Securities in the investment strategy are usually exchanged and/or transferred without regard to a client’s individual tax ramifications. Certain investment opportunities that become available to Stringer Asset Management’s clients may be limited. Risks Related to Currency Hedging: Stringer Asset Management strategies that invest in non-U.S. securities may employ a currency hedging strategy. Because of this, these strategies may have lower returns than an equivalent non-currency hedged investment when the component currencies are rising relative to the U.S. dollar. As such, contracts to sell foreign currency will generally be expected to limit any potential gain that might be realized by the strategies if the value of the hedged currency increases. Risks Related to REITs: Stringer Asset Management's strategies may invest in real estate investment trusts ("REITs"). REITs' share prices may decline because of adverse developments affecting the real estate industry, such as declining real estate values, changing economic conditions, and increasing interest rates. The returns from REITs may trail returns from the overall market. Additionally, there is always a risk that a given REIT will fail to qualify for favorable tax treatment or may not remain qualified as a REIT.

Risks Related to MLPs: Stringer Asset Management's strategies may invest in Master Limited Partnerships ("MLPs"). Investing in MLPs includes risks, such as equity and commodity-like volatility. Principal Risks (continued):

Risks Related to Fixed Income: Stringer Asset Management's strategies that utilize debt securities are subject to the risk that changes in interest rates could affect the value of a client's investment. Rising interest rates tend to cause the prices of debt securities (especially those with longer maturities) to fall. Rising interest rates may also cause issuers to pay off mortgage-backed and asset-backed securities later than anticipated, forcing the strategies to keep their money invested at lower rates. Falling interest rates, however, generally cause investors to pay off mortgage-backed and asset-backed securities earlier than expected, forcing the strategies to reinvest the money at a lower interest rate. The concept of duration is useful in assessing the sensitivity of fixed income strategies to interest rate movements, which are the main source of risk for most fixed income securities. Duration measures price volatility by estimating the change in price of a debt security for a 1% change in its yield. For example, a duration of five years means the price of a debt security will change about 5% for every 1% change in its yield. Thus, the higher the duration, the more volatile the security. Debt securities have a stated maturity date when the issuer must repay the principal amount of the bond. Some debt securities, known as callable bonds, may repay the principal earlier than the stated maturity date. Debt securities are most likely to be called when interest rates are falling because the issuer can refinance at a lower rate. The credit rating or financial condition of an issuer may affect the value of a debt security. Generally, the lower the quality rating of a security, the greater the risk that the issuer will fail to pay interest fully and return principal in a timely manner. The issuer of an investment-grade security is more likely to pay interest and repay principal than an issuer of a lower rated bond. Credit ratings are not an absolute standard of quality, but rather general indicators that reflect only the view of the originating rating agencies from which an explanation of the significance of such ratings may be obtained. If an issuer defaults or becomes unable to honor its financial obligations, the security may lose some or all of its value.
